### Advent: A Time of Waiting and Expectation

The season of Advent begins liturgically by looking forward to a second Advent when Christ will return and the world will be judged by God. It is a rather ominous beginning to a season that ends with the birth of a baby. Yet, there is wisdom in a tradition that challenges us to live expectantly.

The Gospel reading for the first Sunday this year is from Matthew 24. It assures us that there is no knowing when Christ will return, but also that there is no knowing who are or are not true believers. Throughout Matthew's gospel there are passages that emphasize insiders and outsiders, but never is there a code for us to use to determine who is in and who is out: it is always God's job to do the judging.

Matthew is consistent in delivering the message that the element of surprise is an invitation to be prepared and suspend our worries about dividing people until a time when God will take care of everything. In the meantime we are to be about the work of God as demonstrated and taught by Jesus.

It is tempting to think that our gift buying binges, wrapping frenzies, and Christmas parties are a good metaphor for the season celebrated by the Church each December. Scripture does challenge us not simply to idly wait for the second Advent. However, I've come to the conclusion that the Christian life is nothing like our 21<sup>st</sup> century Christmas preparations.

Firstly, our waiting is extremely temporary, we know what day all of our frenzied gift-related activities will come to an end (depending on how much of a procrastinator you are — the end is either the 24<sup>th</sup> or in the wee morning hours of the 25<sup>th</sup>.) But, the end of the world as we know it, is not known to anyone in heaven or on earth. We aren't called to live in a frenzied rush, but with a healthy rhythm of work and Sabbath, prayer and reflection, and concern and care for our neighbor.

Second, our present sense of expectation is rooted in consumerism. Children learn early on that Christmas is about expecting to open gifts. What is the most common question any stranger or well meaning family member always asks my children? "So, what do you want for Christmas?" Oh, sure, we can hope that we are teaching them a sense of expectation around giving and the joy it can bring, but let's be honest, it is overrun by the expectations around what one will receive. Instead, our expectation during Advent is based on the hope of a world set right — a world shaped by God's peace.

*But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father... Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.*

*(Matthew 24:36 and 44)*



Beginning Advent with Matthew 24 focuses our waiting and expectation properly on living in God's kingdom now. It forces us to consider God's call to active preparation: bringing water to the thirsty, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the prisoner, reconciling broken relationships, and loving at all cost.

What will this sort of Advent waiting and expectation mean for you and your family this year? What are some new ways you can be about God's business? What traditions can you ditch in favor of being about God's business?

I hope your family will try out the practice of the Jesse Tree this Advent. It is a wonderful way of rooting this Advent message of active waiting and expectation in God's story as we have learned it through the bible. If you missed the Advent workshop on November 30<sup>th</sup> it is not to

late to get the readings from me and if you want to know more about having a Jesse Tree in your home you can see my November article.
