FROM PASTOR CHAD

Discernment



Discernment has been on my mind for the past couple months. As my youngest child has started hearing back from colleges, my oldest prepares to graduate from college, and our church emerges from a pandemic how do we know what choices to make at this crucial moment?

There is of course the *tried and true* method of making a pro and con list. If you are choosing a college from among several opportunities, for example, you might draw up two columns (labeled *pro* and *con*) for each school and then start listing attributes. Then you take a step back and start weighing what you see on the paper. How important is warm weather and a great campus if your debt load will be unrealistic, etc. I've employed such lists fairly often when facing big decisions.

However, there are more intuitive ways to make big decisions. Some of us are more inclined to simply 'go with our gut'. I have always approached discernment more through intuition than with rational procedures. I try to be

practical, but open to how fear and discomfort are influencing me. Of course sometimes those things are internal warnings that protect us and sometimes they hold us back – so, how are we to know when to listen and when to push past the feelings of fear and take a risk?

Having strategies for discernment is in no way a modern way of thinking. In all times and across cultures there have always been strategies for approaching hard decisions. We have always sought out fellow human beings for their special wisdom and explored practices of listening that might lead us to making clear choices.

There are many places in the bible we might look for wisdom and help with discernment, but I think Paul's letter to the church in Rome holds some pretty good advice. It is helpful to us as we make individual decisions, but maybe even more helpful to us as we discern the future of our congregation together. In chapter 12:2-5 Paul throws us the suggestion that discerning God's will requires both grace and humility. He'll go on to remind us that we are one body – all of us together – and all our different and varied gifts are part of understanding the wisdom of God we seek.

As your pastor I take comfort in the fact that discerning the will of God for our church is not my work alone, but something we work on together. Our process of thinking, listening, and intuiting God's direction is a

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect.

For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned.

PER CAPITA

What's Per Capita? One item in our budget which never receives much attention is our Per Capita expense. This is a fixed dollar amount, \$42.50 per member in 2023, which we pay to our presbytery each year. But what is Per Capita and what is this money used for? Our presbytery describes it as follows:

"In general, it is one of the main ways we live out who we are as Presbyterians. We are a connectional church, and the Per Capita allows us to pool our resources to do many more ministries, missions and programs than any church could possibly do on its own. These dollars are part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together, and allows us to work not only with other Presbyterian churches in our presbytery, but also in our Synod region (the northeast), across the country, and in partnership with other Christian churches around the world. It is how we covenant together to be the larger presence of the church."

Each year we ask our members to pay their portion of Per Capita, but we usually fall short. Our church’s Per Capita this year is \$5,270.
